From the Rabbi's desk

Be Happy it's Adar I!

This month, we gain an extra day—February 29. This is because it takes the Earth 365 1/4 days to orbit the sun (365 days, 6 hours, 9 minutes to be exact). In 100 years or so, the calendar would not match up with the Earth's position vis-a-vis the sun, and eventually the seasons would be out of whack if not corrected.

The Jewish calendar also has a leap year, which sort of coincides with the solar leap year. However, it is not one day we add, but an entire month is added to the calendar every 2-3 years. We do this because our calendar is a luni-solar calendar. Our months are directly related to the cycle of moon's orbit around the Earth. Each month (think "moonth") in the Jewish calendar begins on a new moon. The moon takes 29.5 days to orbit the earth and we have 12 months in the year. Those of you who are good at math will know right away that this means that we have only 354 days in a regular Jewish year. If we didn't account for the difference, we would lose 11 days a year. Before long, we would be celebrating Passover in December and Chanukah in the summer. It specifically says in the Torah that we must celebrate Passover in the spring: therefore the rabbis decided to add this month to our calendar. When do we add this month and what do we call it? We add an extra month after the last month in the Jewish calendar.

That is the month of Adar. When we have a leap year, the added month is Adar II, so this year we have both Adar I and Adar II. Adar I begins on February 9-10.

Adar is the month we celebrate Purim. But what do we do when there is a leap month? We celebrate Purim in Adar II, because it needs to fall one month before Passover. An interesting footnote for those who were born in Adar II: You simply celebrate your birthday in Adar when there is no leap month. The same goes for observing a yahrtzeit. If you were born on the 25th of Adar II, you simply observe it on the 25th of Adar. Much easier than if you were born on February 29th! However, if you were born on the 3rd of Adar II, and your best friend was born on the 28th of Adar I in the same year, your friend is older than you, and celebrates his birthday first. Except when it is not a leap year, you get to celebrate your Hebrew birthday before his!

There is a Talmudic saying, "From the beginning of Adar, we increase our happiness." (B. Taanit 29a). This is in anticipation of Purim. This year we have an extra month to increase our happiness, and also an extra month to get ready to celebrate and party. We will celebrate Purim Saturday evening, March 23. If you would like to chant or read from the Megillah. please let me know. And certainly, let me know if you would like to participate in our Purim Shpiel.

The Board of Trustees met on Monday January 8, via Zoom.

After Rabbi Ballan's invocation, President Joy Bobrow thanked the outgoing Board Members, Trustees and Officers who have served the Temple well and who will hopefully continue to do so in their on-going roles. She has reposted for office bookkeeper and reminded us to forward anyone interested to her attention. She is looking forward to our Congregation Meeting on January 24 and Shabbat Across America March 1.

Gail Tishcoff, Recording Secretary, presented the December minutes which were accepted. Robin Myers, Financial Secretary, submitted her report saying that we currently have 110 member units. Donation statements for 2023 and new dues statements will be mailed out by the end of January. The Board approved the December Financial Report as presented by Treasurer Charlene Metz. The Board reviewed the 2024-2025 proposed budget, as presented by Treasurer Metz and this will be given to the Congregation for vote on January 24.

Geri Weiss, Pulpit and Ritual Committee Chair, reported there will be a Tu Bishvat Oneg with the fruits of Israel on January 26, after the Installation Service.


I have seen the extent to which members love Temple, and the time, money and effort members give to help Temple meet its financial obligations.






As you are reading this piece, depending on your mail delivery, it will either be right before or shortly after I completed the honor of reciting the Kiddush on the Shabbat of Friday, January 26. For not only is it Shabbat Shirah---Shabbat of Song; but, Parashat Beshalach is the 49th anniversary of my bar mitzvah. And, for those who have sat within listening distance of me during services, there is a bit of irony with me celebrating my bar mitzvah on Shabbat of Song---the longest haftorah; and certainly no confusion of who in our home was blessed with the musical genes.

Granted, this special day was almost half-a-century ago. Yet, as I sit in my den and flip through my bar mitzvah photo album, the number of people who are physically no longer with us is so deeply saddening. However, on the other hand, I am truly grateful for the fact that I will have spent part of this weekend with both of my parents, sister and niece (who was not even close to a glimmer then), that there are aunts, uncles and cousins who I have recently seen and there are even friends who were there on January 25, 1975 who I have seen and spoken with in the last handful of months.

And, upon completion of our bar/bat mitzvah class, those friends and I continued to pursue our Hebrew School education. And, my parents, and my friends' parents all stayed involved with what was then Temple Beth Am of Randolph, Massachusetts. Whether they were serving on committees, regularly attending services or partaking in special events---they still were a part of TBA.

Unfortunately, times everywhere have changed. And, often, when a child attains his or her bar or bat mitzvah, that signifies the conclusion of their Hebrew School education for those children and their parents end their synagogue membership.

But, at this time in our world, it is so vital that our children keep learning and our families keep maintaining the foundation of our flourishing Home of Worship---here at Temple Beth Sholom, and throughout our Jewish communities across the United States and around the world.

As I spent the first weekend in December 2023, back where I belonged---as a member of the TBS Bazaar Team, it is apparent that, even though we have unfortunately lost several members and families over the last few years, much of the heart still remains. And, at the risk of forgetting someone, what I must say is that many of our post bar/bat mitzvah children continue to play integral roles in the future of Temple Beth Sholom; and that many of the parents of those same teenagers and young adults, even if their sons and daughters are not residing within the local vicinity---they are still making sure that TBS continues to grow and shine as the family to be a part of, just like it has been for decades and decades.

One's Jewish life and education does not end when celebrating their b'nei mitzvah. As The Carpenters might say---"it's only just begun."




